At the beginning of the summer holidays, a group of Year 8 and 9 students attended a residential choral course run by the Gabrieli Consort's 'Roar!' project. Students rehearsed Mendelssohn's Elijah as part of a large youth choir featuring students from around England. It was a hugely inspiring course, and we are thrilled that we will have the opportunity to take all students attending our school choirs on another choral day run by Gabrieli in Ely Cathedral in December and for them to participate in a residential next summer should they wish.

Quinn, now in Year 10, has kindly written a report of the summer course:

This trip was essentially an opportunity for around 200 students to sing Mendelssohn's "Elijah" with a professional orchestra. We rehearsed for just under a week, residing in Oundle school boarding houses, and were given the chance both to socialise and hone our voices in physically demanding but enriching rehearsals. It was a very enjoyable and professional trip.

Day One involved us checking into our boarding house and being greeted by amicable and efficient Gabrieli pastoral care staff with whom we became very friendly. We left our bags in the relatively clean room and headed over to the chapel, a lovely but echoey rehearsal space to which we soon became accustomed. The get-to-know-you and subsequent rehearsal were lively and energetic, but the real highlight of the first day was the food in the

Refectory: after a hot day of minibus driving and lugging heavy cases about, the meal was to die for! The beds were mildly too hard and there were some rumours of bedbugs but my roommates and I slept very well.

Some of the best fun we had was in the sectionals, rehearsals in which we worked purely with our own voice group. I didn't know anyone in the tenors' group at first but soon made some lovely new friends. My tenor coaches were both fun and professional and we all felt we'd really advanced in our singing abilities. The food remained delectable and activities were provided on a daily basis, including a park run, film night and talent show; all of which were excellently managed and a pleasure to be part of.

The final day in Ely Cathedral was stressful but ultimately rewarding and we were allowed a day off in Ely to recuperate before the big night. Everything went excellently during the concert and the audience seemed to really enjoy themselves.

Overall, I'll have some lovely memories of Oundle: of friends and of singing. It was one of the most well-organised and entertaining school trips I've ever been on and I'd be happy to do more with Gabrieli Consort.
