
Sixth Form

Aleks (10th), Pippa (13th), Jiang (15th) and Ben (16th).




RSPB Big Schools' Birdwatch 6th January20th February

Over the next few weeks, Wildlife + Nature Club will be taking part in the Schools' Garden Birdwatch. We will be counting how many birds we see near The Dip over lunch times. As well as the usual pigeons, gulls and crows that love to frequent the school grounds, we hope to see jays, blue tits, robins, wrens, dunnocks and song thrushes, which are often seen in this area.

Excitingly, you can also get involved at home!



Your how-to-guide and tally chart





27-29 January 2023

Taking part is as easy as 1, 2, 3

Count the birds you see in your garden, from your balcony or in your local park for one hour between 27 and 29 January 2023.

This chart shows some of the birds you might see. Where we don't show male and female birds, the sexes look similar, but are not always identical. Use the tally boxes to help record and count the birds you spot. You'll find lots of tips on identifying birds as well as their calls at rspb.org.uk/birdwatch

It's easy to count the birds you see, if you follow these simple rules.

Only include birds that land, not those flying over. Count the highest number of each species you see at any one time, otherwise you could count the same bird twice. For example, if you saw a group of four starlings, and towards the end of the hour you saw two starlings together, please record four as your final count.

Then tell us what you saw at rspb.org.uk/birdwatch OR complete and send us the print-from-home form.

Whatever you saw – even if nothing at all – please let us know. The more people that submit their findings, the better picture we will have of how garden birds are faring.

If you are unable to submit your results online, please complete and send us the print-from-home form.

How to take part in Big Garden Birdwatch

Taking part is as easy as 1,2,3.

- 1. Watch the birds around you for one hour
- 2. Count how many of each species of bird lands in your area
- 3. Go online onto the RSPB website to log what you've seen

Creative Writing Reward Visit



Last term we ran an in-house Gothic writing opening line competition, and three worthy winners (Nafeesah, Theo and Sasha, all in Year 10) got their reward last Thursday, with a trip to St John's College to meet local author Mark Wells (and also a friendly bonus poet) for an inspiring tour around the Gothic buildings which inspired his writing. Mark could not have been more helpful and accommodating and the librarian had put out exhibits and manuscripts in the old

library especially for us, including a song book written on calf skin, showing us how to identify the hairy side and the flesh side of each page.

Mrs Pinder-Ashenden described the experience as "seventh heaven" (she is rather fond of old books) whereas the highlight for the students was a climb to the top of the bell tower for panoramic views over the city. (Mrs Phillips meanwhile thought she might die and hobbled around the next day – so many steep steps!)

A huge thank you to author Mark Wells for kindly suggesting and organising all of this for our students, and a big well done to the three students involved for their exemplary



behaviour. Author Mark Wells was so impressed, he offered that the students could come back with their families at half-term.


Hard at Work in the Library



The library team have been working hard on various jobs in the library, including rewriting the classification number on the spines of non-fiction books where the writing has faded (the library helpers particularly enjoy his job, as it involves looking

up the correct code in the Dewey Decimal classification book) so that books can be properly organised and students can easily locate them on shelves. We've also started the big job of tackling the book club section, which is in need of some TLC. This involves the fiddly job of adding plastic jackets, the author's initial on the spine, the Chesterton stamp, the date

stamp ticket, checking the bar code and then organising the books into alphabetical order. The work is both addictive and time-consuming and we really appreciate the helpers who have gone above and beyond in returning to the library outside of their duty slots to add



just a couple more book jackets. We have lots of books in the book club section for students to borrow, titles where we have multiple copies of the same book, which are perfect to read and discuss as a group. We tend to use these for our Key Stage 3 book club, but they are available for anyone to borrow, so students are encouraged to ask a friend or two if they fancy getting out the same book and then talking about their thoughts on the book together. Or students could take out multiple copies to give to parents/family at home, so that you can enjoy some parallel reading and then talk about it over dinner. We have several sets of 'dyslexia-friendly' quick reads, including some sets which are brand new to the library, and we hope that these might tempt some people who perhaps find reading more tricky to still be involved with reading

along with someone. Our dyslexia-friendly book section is ever expanding as we prioritise our less confident readers, and the books are clearly marked with yellow tape on the spine, plus a pack of different coloured overlays available for students to use while reading. The library is being updated with new books being added and displays being refreshed weekly. Students should consider having a browse of the new Holocaust book display, created to commemorate Holocaust Memorial Day which students will be thinking about in form time next week.

Making the Most of the Library Space

Just a reminder that the library is open and staffed every day before and after school, as a quiet space for students who wish to complete homework or do revision. After school, there is a team of staff on hand to support students who might want some help completing work. Students could perhaps try




Homework Club for a couple of sessions to see if this working pattern suits them, so then they can go home to just relax, knowing homework is out of the way and not hanging over them to be completed later. Students can of course also use the library at break and lunch times for reading and homework, and the jigsaw puzzle seems to be a big draw (especially for Mr Watts, who can never leave until he has placed at least one piece).
