
Library Update


We have a new dictionary corner thanks to a delivery of bilingual dictionaries from the exams office. Using a dictionary instead of an ipad is a bit of a dying art, and we have all sorts of dictionaries to interest people, including illustrated and themed dictionaries. EAL students who will be using bilingual dictionaries in their exams might find it helpful to practise using one for doing school work.



We have new books in the library including a new anthology of short stories "Integer", some written by our prize-winning Chesterton students – please come to have a look if you want to see the work of Caleb, Xinyang, Privthvi, Shivani and Iana in print.

All the university prospectuses have moved to the sixth form common room, so we have now reorganised with a focused designated area for books and info about selecting A-levels and sixth forms and other post-16 options, alongside GCSE study skills, which should be of particular interest to our Year 10 students.

Our dragons have flown away after our themed Dragon Week before Easter, and we are still looking for suggestions of future themed weeks. Lots of dragon books are out on loan, which is fab, and we have had requests to get in more of the 'Wings of Fire' series.











We are appealing to Year 11 students and parents to make sure Year 11 return all their library books this half term please. It saves the library team a lot of time if these come back with our needing to chase up individuals for books. Library books can be dropped off in the returns box any day before or after school or at break or lunch, and we don't charge overdue fees.

Chesterton Culture – School Ethos work

The NT Connections Company of Chesterton Youth Theatre proudly toured 'Is my Microphone on?' to the Royal Theatre in Northampton on Sunday 16th April. Having wowed home crowds in their performances last term, they developed the show as advised by their mentor director from the National Theatre, so that the filmic and amplified aspects of it might be more performative. This involved Bill, another former student of Chesterton and NYT member, joining the cast as an onstage camera operator/actor: along with the 36 other

cast members, he brought the show to 'the next level' and those who saw it last Sunday have described it as a 'triumph' and one of CYT's best ever performances.

Ms Marston, Mr Cooper, Sierra, Amy and Alex (the adult creative team) all felt exceptionally proud of the student actors, not just for their mesmeric performance but for their conduct throughout their time at the Royal & Derngate Theatre, where they were consummate professionals and a joy to be around.



Here's what sixth form student Josh had to say to the rest of the team (age 12 - 18):

"Now that you have all had some time to reflect and absorb what we feel about the performance on Sunday, I think this is a good time to really appreciate what happened. The way you handled the day was perfect. It was an early start for all of us, but everyone was so focused, connected by a common goal. The workshop was professional and inspiring! As the instructor said himself, "(We) were the best group (he) had seen" and that is something to be proud of!

What we did was truly special and we all need to celebrate this immense achievement. You all performed with a collective strength and truth that was inspiring to be a part of."

It's also vital to remember that the message of the show is: reduce carbon emissions. This Saturday is World Earth Day — what are you doing to be part of this? Our beautiful Earth needs us! The Company remains in solidarity about sustainability, and meanwhile, we await to see who the National Theatre directors will choose from across the country to represent 'Is My Microphone On?' in July at their home venue. There is absolutely no doubt about it: we all tried our very best, and when the coach broke down on the way home from a 12-hour day, it couldn't break our spirits!
