
Open Evening


Curiosity Cube


Last Friday (14th October), two Year 7 Science classes went along to the Curiosity Cube run by the Bioscience company Merck at the Cambridge Science Park. The Curiosity Cube is a shipping container that has been cleverly converted into a laboratory and has been on a global tour that stopped off in Cambridge last week.

With the help of Scientists working at the Science Park the students used microscopes to identify a selection of the many types of bacteria that live on, in and around us. They also saw how



their everyday decisions about what they eat and what they do has a dramatic effect on the make-up of their gut microbiome (the community of microbes living within our digestive tract).

Year 7 Spotlight





Staff book review

This week's reading recommendation is from Mr Simonsen (Biology Teacher) who recommends "The War of the Worlds" by H G Wells.

Mr Simonsen says, "Considering H G Wells was a biologist and teacher, with his first published work being a biology textbook, it's no surprise he is one of my favourite authors. "The War of the Worlds" is such a fantastic piece of true science fiction, meaning that everything that happens in the book is scientifically possible... Wells uses his understanding of science in this way to make you



really question your position in nature as a human. For me, these aspects of the book make it a thrilling but thoughtful read."

November will be the month of reading

Readathon

November 2022 will be our first whole-school readathon in conjunction with the charity Read for Good, in which students in Key Stages 3, 4 and 5 are encouraged to read more/more widely, track their reading, and, if they wish, ask family and friends to sponsor them, to raise money to provide books for children in hospital. More details will go out next

half term via Parentmail, and all students will be introduced to the readathon in lessons in the week commencing 31st October. Students can look forward to different activities to promote reading, such as dedicated lesson slots, displays, and in-school rewards. We shall also have some special visits and events and book sales, such as popular young adult author Chris Priestley coming in to talk to the whole of Key Stage 3 on Tuesday 22nd November; we have plenty of his books in our school library if students want to get reading before we meet him. Book club news

This week the Key Stages 4/5 and staff book club had its first in-person meeting, and we discussed our ideas about "Under Milk Wood". The general feeling was that the book is a bit 'marmite' — we weren't quite sure if we loved it or hated it. With 60 characters to keep track of (some of them dead) and no clear plot line, this was more of a slice-of-life look at a town than a typical fictional story with a clear narrative arc. This was a great book to do some deep thinking about what we like about books, but for the next half term, we thought we'd go with more of a crowd-pleaser: Harper Lee's "To Kill a Mockingbird". We will next meet in-person in December, but students and staff are very welcome to start reading and posting their comments on the book club Team in the meantime. There are plenty of copies in A11 if anyone should like to join in reading with us. Also, some of the Key Stage 3 book clubbers are partway through reading this book at the moment (another glitch in the matrix?) so it will be a great shared experience to discuss with friends and family — parents and carers are very much encouraged to read along with us.

Peer reading recommendations

The Year group Teams pages all have reading recommendation channels, which are bursting full of chatter about what students are enjoying reading. It has been very encouraging to see students discovering they have a peer who is a fan of the same book as they are, and to hear students say that they have picked up a book based on what another student in their Year wrote about it. Do keep the recommendations coming – it's great to see students being enthusiastic about reading, and remember that a review earns an ABP. We shall also do our best to order the most popular books into our school library.

Book exchange

Thursday 20th October was a school book exchange, held at break and lunch times in the atrium. It was fantastic to see lots of students dropping by and responding enthusiastically to the piles of books available to take home for free. Students are always very welcome to borrow books from our school library, but there is of course something very special about

having a book of your own to keep or perhaps to pass onto a friend. Thanks to everyone who took part – to the Site Team for shifting heavy boxes of books around, to everyone who donated books from home, and to staff and students who supported the event by picking up books. Our next school book exchange will be at the festive fair in December, and we also hope to establish a rolling book exchange cupboard.

Cambridge Literary Festival

Cambridge Literary Festival runs 17th to 20th November, with all sorts of writers leading presentations and discussions about their books. There are some huge names on the billing, including Jeremy Hunt and Jarvis Cocker, and topics range from baking to racism.
