Cambridge Literary Festival: Refugee Tales

On Friday 21st April, 25 Year 9 volunteers along with Miss Bean, Mrs Phillips and Mr Sedgwick, attended a Cambridge Literary Festival event "Over the border" which shared the stories of refugees. Our students listened attentively to harrowing tales of people fleeing ill-treatment, and of the lives of asylum seekers in detention in the UK. We could not all help but be affected by the stories, and left feeling moved, and with a goodie bag which even included a free book of real refugee stories, written in the style of Chaucer's Canterbury Tales. The event gave us plenty to think about, about the plight of refugees (perfect for a Geography unit on this topic) and the power of stories to create community

and influence change. For any student who is interested, there is a follow-up creative writing project, whereby students can respond creatively (art, poem, prose) to the theme of 'Over the border' and have their work published in an online magazine. More details can be found here:
