Robinson House



- "Even if you don't take History or don't like trains or Vikings, the trip is actually really fun you get the one-off opportunity to have a selfie with Mr Ware."








This Week's Staff Book Recommendation

Dragons in the Library (and future library themed weeks?)



Chesterton Science Week

Students had a chance to take part in a variety of Science activities during their lessons this week and also explore the Science themed display provided for us in the library. This year's theme was *Connections*. So alongside the Air Rockets (most of them returned to terra firma...), the methane mambas and the whoosh bottle explosions, students had a go at fun activities which helped illustrate the inter-connectivity between the living and non-living elements of ecosystems using large balls of string to model the interactions. Other groups discovered how their meal selections were linked to CO₂ emissions and water usage, hunted for elusive microscopic tardigrades living in moss, or had a play with some Physics toys.
