On Wednesday, 30 year 7 students travelled across Cambridge to the University of Cambridge's Physics Department at the Cavendish Laboratory to take part in an exciting workshop ran by online platform Isaac Physics. The students worked in the physics undergraduate laboratory where they investigated the stretching properties of different sweets. The students were surprised by how much weight peach loops could support before breaking and were able to conclude which sweets would stretch the most. Once the students had finished their experiments and drawn graphs to present their findings, we moved into the Pippard lecture theatre. Students were very excited to sitting in a real lecture theatre where they learned more about weight forces and used their problem-solving skills to answer questions based on planets with different strengths of gravity!

All students engaged very well, they learned a lot and really enjoyed being in a university building. One student even said, "Miss, I thought I was really bad at Physics, but I am getting all of these questions right!".



Miss Weedy (English teacher) recommends Slaughterhouse-Five by Kurt Vonnegut.



Slaughterhouse-Five is a semi-autobiographic science fiction-infused anti-war novel, inspired by Vonnegut's own experiences during the fire-bombing of Dresden in 1945. Vonnegut is a master of dark, absurdist comedy, and right from the beginning the novel is a tug-of-war between laughter and tears. Aimed at KS5 and up because of adult themes.
