## All go in the library again

The library has been bursting particularly with enthusiastic Year 7s every break and lunch, with borrowing at record levels. To help our Year 7s get used to our set-up, each Year 7 English class will undertake a library induction lesson to practise finding and reshelving books, learning how to use the author surname for fiction and the Dewey Decimal system for non-fiction. We also want all our students to understand the expectations of behaviour in the library (quiet reading and working, out of respect for those who need a quiet space to concentrate) and how to leave the room tidy for the next group.

The library is looking updated and wellorganised thanks to new shelving and a big reorganisation, with fiction now grouped into three categories of 'first steps' (formerly KS3), 'bridging the gap' (slightly more challenging reads), and 'older readers' (books with more adult themes aimed at KS4 and 5), now our school is catering for three key stages. A huge thank you to Mrs Pinder-Ashenden who has been working tirelessly on this job, with many hours spent on checking, cataloguing and shifting books. A well-organised and smoothly-functioning library is a real boon to the whole school community, so we are all thankful to her for this important and often unseen work. The Year 7 author projects are also eye-catching additions, with students tempted to try new authors recommended by their peers, and we have new signage, with some input from the art department. Our new team of library volunteers are keen to get going, and in the meantime, some of last year's volunteers have been kindly working on checking all non-fiction are in numerical order. 'Books and biscuits' is now up and running again, with some lovely new staff and student faces, and two books on the go. KS3 students are welcome to drop in any Friday breaktime.

The library team are planning a 'Beano' week in October, followed by a 'dark reads' theme ready for the clock change. We welcome suggestion of other themed weeks students would like to see.

# Staff reading recommendation of the week

Mrs Phillips recommends "A Terrible Kindness" by Jo Browning Roe. # Supporting reading and encouraging reluctant readers

We want everyone in our school community to access and enjoy books, and we recognise that some students need a bit more support and encouragement than others. Students who are struggling to keep up with curriculum reading demands, for example, Year 11 students who need to read 'An Inspector Calls' for their Literature GCSE, will find the books, space and support to read in the library; Mrs Phillips at lunch or the homework club team after school will be happy to set up reading circles to help get students through.

Our school website has support and suggestions for families to promote reading, including recommended reading lists for each school Year, and ideas for engaging reluctant readers.

In school, we run a paired reading scheme, whereby parent and sixth form volunteers meet to read with a KS3 student. We are currently organising rotas and training, with a view to launching next week! If any other members of our local community (parents, grandparents, etc) feel they could give 20 minutes a week to read with a student (normally 8.50-9.10am one morning a week) we should love to hear from you.
