## Unveiling the Secrets of Henry VIII's Bible with Dr. Eyal Poleg

On Monday the $16^{\text {th }}$ October, we had the next instalment of our fantastic Chesterton lectures series on "Fantastic Forests and where to find them" kindly led by Daniel Foster. Thank you to everyone who came along! Our next talk is planned for Monday the 6th November, 15:10-4pm. Led by historian Dr Eyal Poleg from Queen Mary's University, London it will examine, "What happens when you X-Ray Henry VIII's Bible?" Dr Poleg writes:
"Recently we took Henry VIII's personal copy of the Great Bible to a large Xray machine in Whittlesford. The results blew us away. Using a microscopes and light sources we revealed how Thomas Cromwell photoshopped himself into the Bible. This machine showed hidden and systematic manipulation of the page, helping us lean more about Tudor politics and religion. I will present some of these exciting finds, and ask how these technologies change the way we look at Henry's court and English Reformation.

I am a historian, specialising in books and objects from the Middle Ages and the Reformation. I mostly work with scientists, libraries and museums to develop new ways of learning about the past."

## Year 11 English event

On Monday $16^{\text {th }}$ October, we welcomed Dr Rawlinson-Mills of Cambridge University to our school library, to run a workshop for Year 11 students who are considering studying English post-16. Our students were treated to a really inspiring session, considering the question,
"What is poetry?". Dr Rawlinson-Mills introduced us to undergraduate-level ideas such as Rosenblatt's reader-response theory, and then applied them to cutting edge poetry such as Antrobus's "Dear hearing world" to encourage students to have an authentic aesthetic response. Students (and staff) were completely captivated, and participated brilliantly in the session. Dr Wickes and Mrs Phillips now both want to go back to university, and one student even responded to the session in poetic form (below). It was really helpful for students considering their post-16 options, with lots of students staying on after school to ask Dr Rawlinson-Mills questions about further study, university options, and careers leading from English. The session was so good that we are now trying to arrange a similar one for Year 10 - details to follow. Many thanks to Dr Rawlinson-Mills for volunteering her time in this way, and to our students for all their enthusiasm.
