'Fever' – CYT at its Best!

Congratulations to the company of year 10/13 for their exceptional performances in 'Fever!', CYT's adaptation of Arthur Miller's 'The Crucible'. On the second and final night of this production, the quality of acting and dramatic staging showcased Chesterton Youth Theatre at its very best, and it would be hard to find a group of 14 or 15 year-olds - even professionals - able to match the visceral, charged, sublime quality of performance. One audience member commented whilst in tears at the end of this tragedy that 'It was the best piece of theatre I have ever seen', whilst a film producer from London who came to watch said 'I am blown away: the intellectual stamina of these young actors is deeply impressive. Even though I know his fate, I was willing the plot to change and for John Proctor to live, such was the power of the central performance.'

At points in the process, the project felt overly epic and ambitious in scale. But having reached the 'zenith of the mountain' - where all our dreams and hopes for the show came

into being everyone involved has left the play with the sense

that the challenge was wholly worth taking. 'This should win awards' was another audience member's remark: we only hope that Miller's message will impact beyond our audiences in a world where, the Company were united in believing, we must always stand up against authoritarianism, and tell the truth.

Year 12 German Debating Competition

Last week we went to the Perse School to take part in an MFL debate and found there was only one other German team against us! Despite the fact that they were very nice, we had to get into debating mode and present our arguments with conviction! The three debates were fun, if difficult and nervewracking at first! It was great to go to another school and meet other students studying German. We found out we had several other subjects in common as well. Debating in German was very hard, but it was a great experience, and although the results were extremely close, we ended up winning!

As a way to enrich our knowledge of German, our Y12 class signed up to a language debating competition at the Perse School. There were three main motions : "We should abolish private schools", "Marriage is no longer important in our society", and "Streaming services will replace normal television". We split the topics between us and after some research, prepared short notes for each motion - 50 words for, and 50 words against. On arrival, we were assigned our positions on the motion, and immediately started debating. For each motion, each side gave a 2-minute introduction, and after a subsequent free debating period of 4 minutes, we gave our closing arguments. After all three rounds, the judges issued their verdict. Although we had debated against only one other school, it was still very tense and challenging, making the fact that we won, even more satisfying. Overall, I really enjoyed this experience and the skills I gained from it. It definitely helped bolster my confidence in speaking in another language in a real-life scenario about complex topics.

The venue was sold out, raising over £1200 pounds for our school, so a big thanks to all who came along. The Maths Department at Chesterton Community College and Sixth Form is immensely proud of its students and extends a heartfelt THANK YOU for their dedication throughout this term. A special acknowledgment goes to our Year 11 students, who have been diligently preparing for their upcoming GCSE exams.

These past three months have been bustling with various events organized for our students. In January 2024, we became part of the **Problem-solving Schools project**. This initiative aims to foster a culture of mathematics appreciation among our learners and delve deeper into the achievements of a diverse range of mathematicians. Thanks to the support of the Parents Teachers Association, our library now boasts several math books spanning three different categories: History of Mathematics, recreational, and problem-solving.

Continuing from the Autumn term, our students enthusiastically participated in one of the **UKMT** challenges. This time, they tackled the Intermediate Maths Challenge and its subsequent rounds like the Grey Kangaroo and Cayley Olympiad. We eagerly anticipate the results, with the Junior Maths Challenge scheduled for April.

Additionally, eight of our Year 10 students engaged in the **Maths Feast** in January. With two dedicated teams, they dedicated their Fridays after school to practice past questions, culminating in a problem-solving event in Linton. Here are the reflections from our students on their experience:

"We really enjoyed our trip to Linton Village College for the Maths Feast. There were four rounds of various challenges, including a quiz show-themed round, a universe probability round, and an exciting origami round! The origami round was our favorite, where we had to form 16 3D shapes and merge them into two larger shapes. This unexpected challenge added to the enjoyment. At the end, there was a celebration of everyone's achievements, and we were honored to win a certificate for teamwork.
