> were involved in some form of adventure training from Wales to the South of France


> > • Service and Giving: 137 students spent time exploring out city and improving the environment we live in

Y12 biology students were sampling invertebrate biodiversity this week. They designed their own capture-mark-releaserecapture study to measure the abundance of Cornu aspersa in 'The Dip' nature reserve, and are using samples collected from tree beating in the same area to calculate the Simpson's Diversity Index. ID work is still ongoing, but highlights included a number of impressive bush crickets!

#### We have had a very busy few weeks with students completing their social action projects and enrichment week.

All sixth form students have planned and completed their social action projects, with UK based students completing community litter picks; bake sales; and running stalls at our PTA event. They raised money for the PTA too, which is going to have longer term impact. The other half of the cohort, visited Kenya to complete social action work in our partner primary school, the trip had a profound impact on our students and the Kenyan's, here is a **link** to our Kenya blog.



Our enrichment week brought students back together, with the first all about developing key future and enterprise skills and the second day being the paper clip challenge. Students were tasked with heading into town to trade their paper clips up for items. Students returned with an array of items totalling over £150 shelf value. Whilst all of this was going on, 7 students attended an enterprise workshop for two days at the council buildings in Cambroune. This is part of a programme to develop products and take them market. The students came up with great ideas and have learned a lot from the ley note speakers and subsequent tasks. On our final day, we collaborated for a community lunch, with student bringing in a dish that represented them and their culture. We had such a range of food from across the world and it was very tasty.

Finally, we would like to make note of a student that has received a number of awards recently, which is testament to the hard work that they put in day in, day out. Jay Tuffnell has written about their excellent achievements:

In November I entered East London University's humanities essay competition on imperialism and was shortlisted in the top 1% of 2000 entries. I researched outside of my history Alevel unit on Russia to find out more about Ukraine's historic relationship with the Russian empire and how it has informed the worldview of Putin and Zelensky, the annexing of Crimea and the current conflict.

In February I entered Oxford University's Rex-Nettleford prize on colonialism and won first place. I studied the British empire's control over Palestine during the mandate period, especially the educational practices implemented. I spent an evening at Oriel's high table and spoke with leading historians – I was sat next to Lyndal Roper, the first woman to hold the Regius Chair in history. She told me about her fascinating research into the reformation and peasant rebellions in Germany.

In June I completed Cambridge University's Pelican Programme in history. For over 6 months, we had met weekly over zoom to discuss ideas and were always sent away with a research task or challenging readings. After consistent excelling contribution, I was selected for a residential at Corpus Christi - a few dozen students were invited out of the hundreds which participated in the programme. I was seated at the high table for my contributions and was the first nonpostgrad to ever eat at Corpus' high table.

In July I was a finalist for the Orwell Youth Creative-Political Writing Competition. The celebration at UCL hosted the finalists - 15 out of the 820 submissions received. I read my work in front of my fellow finalists and the judging panel which contained Orwell's son (Richard Blair) and rising UK poets.

# Year 7's Wildlife Adventure

The yr7s in Cambridge headed along the guided busway to RSPB Fen Drayton lakes for their Environmental enrichment day. Huge numbers of different species of plants and animals spotted around the reserve as we built up our identification skills out in the wild. Including a dragonfly which was calmly eating a bee that it had caught.



# Y8-9 German Exchange 2024

Thirteen Year 8 and five Year 9 students enjoyed an action-packed week in Schriesheim, near Heidelberg. Students stayed with German families and made the most of experiencing a different culture as well as improving their German language skills. Highlights included a trip to Heidelberg Castle, meeting the local mayor, and a day-trip to the cathedral city of Speyer where the huge technical museum proved very popular, as did the local ice cream!

# **Battlefields Trip 2024**

During enrichment week, Year 9 students went to leper (Belgium) and surrounding areas to visit the battlefields, memorials, and cemeteries from the First World War.



We were impressed by students' reflections on the different approaches to remembering the First World War – comparing, for instance, the daily Menin Gate Ceremony to the sombre atmosphere of Langemark – and by their serious engagement with the artefacts and information in the In Flanders Fields Museum. Staff at the museum even commented on their exemplary conduct. As always, the trip was rounded off with a trip to a Belgium chocolate shop and we arrived back in the UK with much heavier bags!

On Thursday 4<sup>th</sup> July, students from Years 7-10 gave solo and small ensemble performances in a lunchtime recital at St Andrew's Church, Chesterton. The students represented our school brilliantly. Well done to all involved.

# **Chesterton Mock Election**


On Thursday the 4<sup>th</sup> of July (election day) Chesterton community College had its own mock general election.

This election was planned and organised by the Chesterton electoral commission comprising of Mr Reed, Mr Moore, Mr Benger, and Mr Ware.



We all felt that the general election provided a unique opportunity to help promote our student's engagement in both national politics and democracy. Also, on a practical level we realised that in 2029 students in years 8 – 13 will be eligible to vote and we and the school's senior leadership team believed it was crucial that students were taught how to both decide who to vote for and the actual process of voting in person.

In the weeks building up to the election during tutor time students took part in sessions which showed them how our electoral process works, the key manifesto promises of our 5 main political parties and how to fact check manifesto promises and pledges.
