### 6<sup>th</sup> Form German Students Shine at BFI Film Study Day

In December, four of our A Level German students attended the Legacy of East Germany: A Film Study Day at the British Film Institute (BFI) in London. The event was a fantastic opportunity for students to deepen their cultural and linguistic understanding of German through the medium of cinema.

The day began with a fascinating morning session conducted entirely in German. This immersive approach challenged students to engage with the complexities of East Germany's social, political, and cultural legacy, while simultaneously developing their listening and comprehension skills. The session featured analysis of iconic films about the GDR era, including Good Bye, Lenin! (2003), Der Ballon (2018), Das Leben der Anderen (2006), and Sonnenallee (1999). Students explored how cinematic techniques such as camera angles and music are used to convey narratives of power structures, sparking insightful discussions.

We were particularly proud when one of our students was praised by the session leader for his valuable contributions to the analysis. His thoughtful interpretations showcased a deep understanding of the material and an impressive ability to articulate his ideas confidently in German.

In the afternoon workshop, the students delved deeper into Good Bye, Lenin!—a film they study as part of their A Level course. The focused analysis reinforced their knowledge of the film and its historical context, leaving them inspired and better prepared for their upcoming assessments.

A highlight of the day was the opportunity for our students to interact with a large cohort of other A Level German learners from schools across the UK. With our Sixth Form German classes being small and language learning often viewed as niche, it was incredibly encouraging for them to be surrounded by like-minded peers who share their passion for the subject.

Overall, the trip was a resounding success. We are delighted to congratulate our students on their enthusiastic participation and thank them for representing the school so well. Their curiosity and commitment to learning German truly shone throughout the day.



## Year 8 Students Take on 'Hive Heroes' Science Challenge


On Tuesday afternoon Dr Timney's year 8
Science class took part in a 'Hive Heroes'
workshop run by Lily Hunter Green and Karun
Matharu from the Maori lab at the University of
Cambridge. The game-based activity had
groups of students role playing as worker
honey bees whilst the wearable tech vests
keep track of their current health.

Students learnt how infections, but also immunity via transmissible RNA, could be spread through the colony as a result of their collective behaviour whilst carrying out essential hive jobs. They then developed behaviour strategies to help to keep the colony successful and healthy.

Not only great fun for our students, but the strategies they developed and analysis of their movements during the game will be fed back into the ongoing research at the Maori lab.
