Report on the consultation of the admission arrangements of Chesterton Community College effective from 1 September 2026.

The Proposals

This report considers the consultation undertaken by Eastern Learning Alliance for Chesterton Community College.

The Admissions Code requires schools to undertake a consultation on admission arrangements every time there is a proposed change or within 7 years of the last consultation even when no changes are proposed.

No changes have been proposed to the current admission arrangements.

The admission arrangements are proposed to come into effect from 1 September 2026 for the 2026/2027 admissions.

The Consultation

The consultation ran from 29 November 2024 for six weeks in term time until 17 January 2025

The documents were shared by email, school websites and available as hard copies. Online consultations were also carried out (copies can be located in Appendix A).

Consultation documents were sent to:

- Parents and pupils at the academy
- The governors and staff at Academy
- The feeder primary schools
- Schools in the school cluster groups
- Diocesan Boards of Education
- Trade Unions who represent staff at the schools
- Local Members of Parliament
- Local County Councillors, District Councillors and Parish Councillors

Respondents were invited to share their views in the following ways:

- Completing an online survey
- Completing the form attached to the consultation document
- Emailing the school consultation email address
- Writing to the school office

Summary Analysis

The full analysis is available in Appendix B.

Overall, there were 21 responses to the consultations. The response rate is low.

- 6 people strongly agreed or agreed (28.6%)
- 2 person neither agreed or disagreed (9.5%)
- 13 people strongly disagreed or disagreed with the proposal (61.9%).

Key comments and concerns raised were:

- UCPS is not a feeder school for CCC
- Students living in the catchment area should be prioritised regardless of primary school attended

Conclusion

Eastern Learning Alliance has a duty to ensure the admission arrangement for its schools are fair and reasonable. Over summer 2024 an independent School's Adjudicator reviewed the admission arrangement for the school in relation to concerns raised from a parent at UCPS. The School's Adjudicator collated evidence from Chesterton Community College, the Local Authority and the parent. Upon review of this evidence, it was concluded that the arrangements for the school were fair and reasonable and in alignment with the Admissions Code.

There was a full consultation to designate UCPS as a feeder school to Impington Village College. The school is in an area that is outside of the catchment area for Chesterton Community College. There have never been any plans for Chesterton to amend its catchment area to take account of the new school. It is therefore considered that it is reasonable to proceed with the admission arrangements with no amendments.

Response rates to the consultation were low.

The main areas of concern raised during the consultation relate to:

Children living in the catchment area who attend a primary school outside of the catchment area that is therefore not a feeder school for Chesterton Community College.

These concerns can be addressed by:

- There have been no changes to the catchment area for Chesterton Community College and UCPS has therefore not been excluded from this.
- When it was proposed that UCPS join Impington Village College a full consultation was held.
- An independent Schools Adjudicator has reviewed all of the points that have been raised and they determined that the admission arrangements are fair and reasonable.

Recommendation

In balancing the responses and comments received during the consultation it is recommended to the Governors of Chesterton Community College, on behalf of Eastern Learning Alliance that it is **agreed** that from 1 September 2026, unamended admission arrangements will come into effect.

Appendix A

There have been no substantive changes made to the admissions arrangements for the college, this consultation ensures compliance with the Admissions Code.

Admission Authorities must ensure that their arrangements will not disadvantage unfairly, either directly or indirectly, a child from a particular social or racial group.

It's a pity that there is no way to control distance lived from the school after a place has been offered. For example, we know children commuting to Chesterton from the Shelfords and Northstowe to attend the school. As a consequence, we also know families whose children did not get a place but still live within a mile of the school. My children attend University of Cambridge Primary school and Chesterton Community College is our closest secondary school. We live between the 2 schools and would have to drive to get to any other secondary school. I do not understand why Univeristy of Cambridge Primary school is not classed as a "feeder school". I also think it is unfair that my children would rank lower in the case of over subscription to Chesterton than those who go to feeder primary schools, even though we are likely to live much closer. I would advocate for removing the prioritisation of children in feeder primary schools over those	There was a consultation with UCPS to determine that it would be a feeder school of Impington Village College due to Darwin Green not having been built. The criteria have been reviewed by a School Adjudicator and it has been determined that they are fair. The proposed criteria is crucial in terms of equity of access to Chesterton because it ensures that students attending catchment primary school but living in the less affluent areas are not disadvantaged due to distance lived from the school. in non-feeder primary schools	

In my opinion, everybody living in the catchment area should be treated equally independently to the primary school they are attending. If a child doesn't get their catchment school (assuming it is their first choice), then they are automatically at the bottom of any admission list for other secondary schools making it very likely to be given a place either very far or a bad school. The practicalities of doing the school run in primary school are very different to secondary schools for parents to be able to balance their work and school runs. The Council should ensure that any catchment school offers enough places to host ALL the children living in that area.	The building of Darwin Green and provision of additional places is outside of the control of ELA.
The Council should ensure that any catchment school offers enough places to host ALL the children living in that area. Children should be treated equally independently on which school they have been attending.	See comments above.
Until a new school is built, children attending university of Cambridge primary school (UCPS) but LIVING IN CHESTERTON CATCHMENT should be included in the catchment area criteria, even though the school isn't a feeder school. This is because the county council haven't yet built a suitable school for UCPS students to attend for secondary education and many of them live in the Chesterton catchment. Once a new school is built (proposed site at Darwin green) the children attending UCPS can be taken off Chesterton's catchment list. This should therefore be added as a temporary measure to the prosed admissions policy.	See comments above.

Reduction in Intake Capacity: Reducing the intake capacity from 240 to 190 students has had a detrimental impact on the availability of secondary school places for local children. This reduction seems counterintuitive, especially as Darwin Green continues to grow as	There has been no reduction in the school PAN. Chesterton Community College has not made a decision to exclude UCPS as a feeder school, it was never planned as a

a residential area. By decreasing the number of places, the school is effectively excluding children who live within its catchment area but cannot secure a place due to oversubscription. Exclusion of UCPS as a Feeder School: The decision to exclude the University of Cambridge Primary School (UCPS) as a feeder school for Chesterton Community College is particularly concerning. UCPS is geographically located within the Chesterton catchment area, and many families chose UCPS for their children's primary education with the reasonable expectation that they would have access to Chesterton as their local secondary school. This policy change has left many children, including those living close to the school, without a practical secondary school option.

Impact on Darwin Green Families: Darwin Green is a rapidly developing area, yet its residents are facing significant educational challenges due to the lack of a secondary school and the current policies of existing schools. Families from this area are being forced to send their children to schools located more than an hour away by public transport, causing considerable distress to both students and parents. This not only affects students' mental and emotional well-being but also imposes unreasonable logistical burdens on families. Broader Context and Long-Term Planning: The ongoing delays in building the planned Darwin Green secondary school have exacerbated these issues. While the development of new housing continues unabated, the corresponding infrastructure to support the community, particularly in education, is lagging behind. In this context, schools like Chesterton should be increasing their capacity and supporting nearby primary schools, such as UCPS, rather than reducing intake or limiting access.

feeder school for Chesterton. At the point it was determined that Darwin Green would not be built in time to accept the first cohort of year 6 students, in conjunction with the Local Authority, it was determined that UCPS be the feeder school for Impington Village College.

There has been no policy change with regards to the catchment area for Chesterton Community College.

Chesterton Community College has, in recent year, admitted students above PAN, and continues to ensure that this is reviewed and accommodated as far as possible on a year by year basis, while working closely with the admissions team at the local authority to determine where this is necessary.

Unfortunately ELA has no control over the development of Darwin Green or the new school that is proposed, but have continuously advocated for the need for a new school in the area.

Reassess the decision to reduce intake capacity and consider restoring it to previous levels or increasing it to meet growing demand.

Reinstate UCPS as a feeder school for Chesterton Community College, reflecting its geographic proximity and the needs of the community.

Advocate for accelerated progress on the Darwin Green secondary school to provide much-needed educational provision for this rapidly expanding area.

UoCPS is not classed as a "feeder primary" so in See comments above. terms of admissions priority UoCPS children will be ranked lower than those attending feeder primaries, even if they live geographically closer to Chesterton college. This is unfair. As there are no new secondary schools around UoCPS, where will our children will go? I would like to request that Chesterton Community College changes its admission arrangements to allow UoCPS to be on the list of its feeder schools. All the arrangements sound fair. See comments above The admissions policy precludes our child on the See comments above basis of feeder schools Admissions should be based on distance alone Students living in catchment and attending feeder schools are prioritised. This means that regardless of where in the Chesterton catchment a child lived they are prioritised for a place if they attend a catchment primary school. This is crucial in terms of ensuring equity of access to Chesterton because this criterion ensures that students attending catchment primary schools but living in the less affluent areas are not disadvantaged due to distance lived from the school. ELA would consider that it would be unfair to determine places based on the distance from the school for this reason. An independent Schools Adjudicator has reviewed the criteria and determined that the criteria are fair and prioritise students in an appropriate way. We kindly request that you consider expanding the feeder school list to include UCPS, particularly for families living close to CCC but currently excluded by the catchment boundaries. This change would provide more educational choice for local families, upport students' continuity of education and potentially reduce transportation challenges I appreciate your consideration of this feedback and hope you will review the catchment and feeder school criteria.	
University of Cambridge Primary School should also be a feeder school for Chesterton, and therefore pupils who are living in Eddington and attending UCPS should be considered as within the catchment area and attending a feeder school of Chesterton, i.e. (v) within 6.2 criteria. This is because Chesterton is geographically the closest secondary school.	See comments above.
The potential applicants who live in the catchment area but are currently attending feeder schools outside the catchment area are being disadvantaged unfairly. Their alternative options would be quite far away from their home. This condition should be delayed until the planned secondary school at Darwin Green is ready to accept students.	See comments above.
Could CCC apply for short term additional funding to accommodate increased students as the Darwin Green secondary school is behind schedule. This will relief the shortage crisis in the area over the next few years. We are living in the catchment of the Chesterton Community College are still not given a place for our child in the school, despite several applications.	The school is currently oversubscribed and there are waiting lists for all year groups.

When starting at the UCPS school, we did not know it was not a feeder school to Chesterton Community College. We live close to the school, but may not end up being selected to get in. Other students in the same class have started changing school before the end of the year to be in feeder school. This cause uneccessary disruption to the children and the teacher. The system should be revised to just pick the student closest to the school	See comments above. UCPS has never been listed as a feeder school for Chesterton.
