Forest School Update: Creative Projects and Exciting Plans

I wanted to share with you some of the fantastic activities we've been working on at Forest School recently with our Year 7s, 9s, and 10s. Over the past couple of weeks, the students have been immersing themselves in a range of hands-on projects that blend creativity, nature, and practical skills.


Our sessions have been a hive of activity! The students have thoroughly enjoyed building and safely managing small campfires, an essential skill that fosters responsibility and safety awareness. They've also been exploring their creative side by making clay pots and transforming them into handmade candles—a wonderful way to combine art with practical crafting.

We've also been nurturing their connection to nature by planting bulbs and growing plants from seeds, learning about how to care for and sustain living things. Another highlight has been making our own charcoal, which the students then used to create some stunning pieces of outdoor art—combining natural resources with creative expression. Additionally, they've been learning about local wildlife by building cozy, natural nests for birds and small animals, helping to develop their understanding of the environment and animal habitats.

Looking ahead to the summer term, we have plenty of exciting activities planned. The students will be getting hands-on with building bug hotels, learning about insects and their vital role in the ecosystem. We'll also be exploring traditional skills such as wood carving and den building, encouraging teamwork and problem-solving, while giving the students a chance to connect with nature in a safe and supportive environment.

Forest School continues to be a fantastic space for the students to learn new skills, gain confidence, and build a deeper appreciation for the natural world. I've attached a few photos to give you a glimpse of the amazing work they've been doing.
